importance lies in the rapid advancement of technology. Issues such as cybersecurity, digital contracts, intellectual property in the online space, and the use of artificial intelligence have created legal challenges that did not exist a few decades ago. Understanding current issues in business law helps organizations navigate these emerging areas responsibly while protecting innovation and consumer rights. Globalization further highlights the relevance of this topic. Many businesses now operate across borders, making them subject to multiple legal systems. Trade laws, international contracts, taxation rules, and cross-border dispute resolution are constantly changing due to political and economic developments. In addition, modern laws increasingly emphasize corporate social responsibility, fair competition, employee welfare, and environmental sustainability. By understanding these legal expectations, businesses can align profit goals with ethical conduct, building trust with customers, employees, and society at large.

Therefore, in the conference call, we encourage potential speakers to submit presentations on significant and current legal issues related to business law.

We hereby invite you to submit proposals for presentation. The proposal (title and abstract of maximum 3000 characters) and the resume of the presenter in English should be sent to the following address: vig.zoltan@gtk.bme.hu until March 1, 2026.

The Organizing Committee will notify the applicants about the acceptance of their abstracts until March 20, 2026. The submission deadline for the final conference papers is July 31, 2026. This is only for those participants who wish to publish their papers, for others it is enough to submit only the above-mentioned abstract. The length of the papers should be between 40.000 and 45.000 characters, participants will be provided with templates for the papers. Each paper will be reviewed by at least two independent reviewers. Acceptance will be based primarily on relevance, originality, significance, and quality of contribution. Authors should submit only original research manuscripts.

Both active and passive participation is free of charge.
